For Greg Pyra, driving around Alberta isn't a journey; it's his artistic destination. Capturing places of comfort and refuge that are disappearing in small towns, like service stations, fast food joints and service vehicles, allows this Turner Valley artist to discover an inner peace. His stunningly realistic works are not simply landscapes, but images of calm solitude – not *still* life, but only just moving as a long day winds down.

Greg's artist statement integrates his thought process and his paintings:


Travel in our vehicles throughout Alberta is a metaphor for the spiritual journey which we all undertake in life. There is no particular destination for these travels; rather, the journey itself becomes the object of destination. These oil paintings on canvas represent moments of harmony with self and the environment, and a core inner peace. To my mind, the ideal time for these moments is just after sunset when day is not yet complete and night has not yet fallen.

The Princess Margaret Scholarship for Post-Secondary Students of \$500.00 is awarded to the top scoring submission from a post-secondary student. This scholarship is awarded to Cydnee Sparrow of Innisfail, AB. Ms. Sparrow is a practicing rural Alberta artist, who is currently pursuing her Visual Art Diploma at Red Deer College and will receive her diploma this spring. In the fall, she intends to go on to the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design to pursue a Bachelor of Fine Arts. At RDC, she has won numerous awards and scholarships. She is a straight A+ student in all her studio and academic courses, and at the top of her class in art history.

The Canada Centennial Scholarship for Post-Secondary Students of \$500.00 is awarded to the top scoring submission from a post-secondary student in a media other than that awarded to the Princess Margaret Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to Ashley Rose Mercia of Red Deer. Ms. Mercia is enrolled in the Theatre Performance and Creation Program at Red Deer College. She has performed with local Against the Wall Theatre and will be pursuing her improv skills at the Improv Olympic five-week summer intensive training course. Ms. Mercia is a talented actress whose résumé includes writing and creating new formats for Bull Skit as well as teaching and leading community workshops, all while attending RDC.

The Canada Centennial Scholarship for Secondary Students of \$500.00 is awarded to the top scoring submission from a secondary school student. This scholarship is awarded to Kristen Soley. Ms. Soley is currently attending Lindsay Thurber Comprehensive High School. She has performed with the Red Deer Royals and received two awards from this organization. She went to Italy in 2014 with the Royals, learning and experiencing Italian music. Ms. Soley recently won the Woodwind II award for the most outstanding woodwind in LTCHS's symphonic band.

The Waskasoo Bluegrass Music Scholarship for Secondary Students of \$500.00 is awarded to the top scoring submission from a secondary school student studying music and continuing his or her music career in a postsecondary school. This scholarship is awarded to Lane Petrosenko, who is the FIRST student to win this new award of the Red Deer Arts Council. Mr. Petrosenko is currently attending Lindsay Thurber Comprehensive High School. He is a dedicated student whose life revolves around music. En gardé with Thomas Usher Interview by Paul Cowley

Have bullwhip. Lessons available.

That's not on Thomas Usher's business card. But it should be.

"Doing bullwhip, there's not a lot of call for it, but it's really cool that you know how to do it," laughs the director, performer and Red Deer College instructor and certified instructor with Fight Directors Canada. Italian walking sticks and Zulu spears are just a couple of the more offbeat weapons he can wield, along with just about every type of sword and dagger that have pierced a doublet.

Thomas was born and raised in Edmonton to a father who was deputy minister of culture in the Peter Lougheed era, and a mother who was active in the local amateur theatre scene. He had done a small amount of theatre when younger but got serious at the University of Alberta, where he would leave with a bachelor of arts, bachelor of education and master of fine arts degrees. At 25, he was the youngest graduate of the masters in directing program.

While studying, he got involved with Edmonton's Second City and with Theatre Network, doing plays and improv with a focus on Canadian works from 1981 to 1990. He then went to Fort McMurray to join the faculty of the new theatre program at Keyano College.

He would spend four years in Fort McMurray before starting up a new professional theatre company with some friends called Prime Stock Theatre. Faced with a "saturated" local arts scene, the group turned to Red Deer and its first play was staged in the old Kresge's Block downtown in 1994, the first of 18 venues the troupe has used.

Since 1994, Thomas has directed more than 80 plays and acted in another 30 or so. His BARD on BOWER Shakespeare plays have drawn on the Beatles and Beach Boys to add a contemporary twist.

"We always look for ways to make our audiences feel at home with the text," he says. "We all know Hamlet. We all know the story but sometimes it's fun to make it resonate in different ways.

"This summer, it's Buddy Holly. It will be a lot of fun."

He traces his interest in stage fighting to 1990 and was in at the beginning of Fight Directors of Canada.

"I got in on the ground floor and I've been with them ever since. I enjoy it. It's creative and it's fun and it's so safe. Our job is to make it look dangerous ... but nobody wants to get hurt or to hurt anybody so you go out of your way to practise great technique."

He knows it sounds a little cliché to credit the students for bringing him back every year – but it's true. Their enthusiasm to learn new things is infectious.

"You just love being able to open windows and turn the lights on."
